The launch took place shortly after 16 from the forecourt of the Sport Palace. It was a nominal

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launch, attended by a large audience, who rushed to the Fair despite the rainy weather. Everything happened within a few seconds, so that the crowd could barely realize what it was happening.

the rocket fell back into the sea - as expected - about two miles from the coast and was recovered out by divers. It was a great success. The news occupied the front page of many newspapers coming out with headlines such as: "The postal Grillo has jumped well."

In the flight of 3 November Grillo II carried three pounds of mail: in the pack there were 1,600 special envelopes, progressively numbered from 1 to 1600 and franked with an Italian postage stamp that had been canceled by the post office "Genoa Piaz.le JF Kennedy 11/03/65 - detached Facilities." The rubber stamp "in corso particolare" ("in a private course") was added. The cover's cachet features Grillo crossing the Roman arch, while two armed Roman soldiers with spear and

shield observe the scene. On each cover was affixed a colored non-postal stamp with the inscription "steam outflow rocket "Grillo I" on which a corrective stamp had been overlaid with the words "Grillo II - Genova". Three different versions of the non-postal stamp were used with different color: red, blue and violet. Once affixed to the envelope, they were "canceled" with the the rubber stamp "Genova 30 October to 7 November 1965". On November 6, the test flight was repeated with a new postal payload. Alltogether 3064 envelopes, numbered from 1 to 3064, were flown.



The three non-postal stamps used during the two launches from Genoa (collection Bussolino) have different colours.

On each of them the corrective rubber stamp was added, bearing "Grillo II – Genova"
